A Letter From Our Rector Mark Pruitt

Dear Friends,

Some thoughts, looking back over the year(s) behind, and looking forward to the year(s) ahead, in relation to our mission statement.

Our Mission Statement

Living Out a Full Expression of the Christian Faith is the first part of our mission statement. Admittedly, it's ambitious—some may say presumptuous—to think we can embody such an aspiration. But, first, ask who would want to live out a thin, malnourished expression of the faith? Not me! And I hope not any of us.

I am reminded of a professor at Boston College (founded by the Jesuits) who said recently BC stands for Barely Catholic! That's somewhat understandable for an educational institution. Somewhat. Maybe. But congregations that are led by the vision and examples in the New Testament, speaking as it does, of each follower of Christ 'growing in the full stature of Christ,' 'abounding in hope,' of 'love being poured into our hearts,' and of the gospel bearing abundant fruit across the world, and much more, well, no congregation can be satisfied with being barely Christian.

The Holy Spirit: Our Past, Our Present, Our Future

But second, only the Holy Spirit can lead us on toward a maximalist expression of the faith. Throughout the long history of this congregation, the Holy Spirit has been at work. This has been so because God is faithful, because Jesus promised it, because Pentecost happened! But we must pray to be filled again and again, by the Spirit, and pray to be led by the Holy Spirit, "When the Spirit of truth comes," Jesus said, "he will guide you into all truth." (John 16:1). And this means not just theological truth, but in John's gospel, 'living in the truth.'

The pages that follow, displaying many at work to serve their Lord, are evidence of the Spirit's leading in our present time. So many are playing their part in our congregational life and mission. Their response may have felt like a duty. Or it may have been a common-sense answer to a need. They may have stepped up to do something after prayerful deliberation. Or, acted after listening to the Scriptures. Their response may have been responding to conscience, or to a nudge, a tug, hearing a whisper, a faint call.

Moving Forward

A few years ago, we set as priorities (1) the renewal of our music program, which in short, has meant adding new members, and (2) increasing foot traffic. Along with everything we are already doing, these remain a major part of our weekly focus and work as a staff. Recently, we've added two other major priorities: (3) Growing Young and (4) Growing in Evangelism.

A word about each follows.

Growing Young

An increase in foot traffic, a number of baptisms, and new members joining, give us confidence that we can lay down this challenge to younger members of our congregation: namely, to be the next generation of loyal servants. We have had so many solidly faithful parishioners serve in so many ways (on boards, tasks forces, mission work, outreach, etc.,) for so many years, that we can issue the call (and provide the training) for the next generation to take the batons moving into the future. To show the same kind of loyalty evident in previous generations.

And to be loyal out of God's loyalty to us, his creatures, in the gift of Jesus Christ.

Growing in Evangelism

Speaking of God's loyalty to us in the gift of Jesus Christ is a fresh way, perhaps, to think about the gospel. God has not abandoned us to our own fallen ways, but has acted, and still acts, to overcome the relationship between God and creatures that had broken down. It's because God seeks our health and salvation.

Articulating this is part of our task to evangelize and make disciples. The second half of our mission statement keeps this before us: To Call All People to The New Life of Discipleship in Christ.

And so, we are teaching about evangelism and encouraging people to attend our five-session course *Being Renewed...for the Sake of The Gospel*, on the first Sunday nights of the month, beginning in February (except for April in which the first Sunday is Easter, so we meet on the second Sunday. It's geared toward developing a natural way to share our faith with others. Please consider joining!

Mission Highlights

The World Is Our Parish

For generations St. Paul's through its mission activity has provided witness to the love of Christ throughout our local community and the world. Following are the salient points of our work in 2025. Whatever your mission interest, our church has a place for you!

Helping at Home: The Community Meal

Beginning in October 2012, parishioners and clergy have led a short worship service and served supper in the assembly hall to those in need. In 2025, teams prepped, cooked, served and cleaned up for 55 to 70 guests each week. This ministry is the most regularly laborious of St. Paul's work and a big thank-you goes to all those who contribute funds (\$6,731 in 2025), set up tables, cook, serve and clean up for this successful ministry.

Helping at Home: The Christmas Fund

For several decades we have devoted our Christmas giving to helping those with emergency financial needs. This work is our oldest local mission, and it continued in 2025 as we disbursed \$29,969 to assist, mostly with rent and utility bills, 41 families comprising 48 adults and 56 children, which marks an increase over 2024.

Helping at Home: Nan's Giving Tree

Another long-standing Christmas ministry is Nan's Giving Tree, in memory of long-time parishioner and Giving Tree coordinator Nan Bartlett. This mission works with Broken Chain's Lydia's House, a curriculum-based, faith-centered recovery program in a safe home environment based upon Restorative Justice that helps women overcome substance abuse and achieve independence. In 2025, parishioners provided presents for 9 mothers and 23 children. Thank you to all who took a tag from the tree and provided gifts.

Helping Around the World: Mitzvah Day

Volunteers from St. Paul's, Temple Israel and other area congregations met at St. Paul's on Mitzvah Day (June 8) to sew dresses for Dresses with Love, an international organization whose mission is to distribute dresses to girls in need.

Helping Around the World: Disaster Relief

In 2025, St. Paul's Disaster Relief Fund provided \$1,527 to the national church's Episcopal Relief and Development to assist victims of flooding in Texas and other natural disasters.

Helping at Home: Habitat for Humanity

Working with the nine other congregations in the Common Mission Coalition and Habitat for Humanity, in 2025 we completed work on a new ranch house at 595 Hollibaugh Ave. in Akron. The house, built in Habitat's Silver Maple Ridge allotment on North Hill, is already occupied and is the 14th house we have helped to build. St. Paul's parishioners years ago were instrumental in establishing the local Habitat chapter and we continued to support it in 2025 through volunteers (27 different people working across 12 build-days) and financial contributions (\$5,000 in 2025) from our Easter Fund.



Helping Around the World: Haiti

We continued to stay in touch with and pray for our brothers and sisters at St. Etienne's parish, but continued unrest in Haiti hampered progress on new work with the church. Additionally, the local rector with whom we were working took a position in Canada. Although we have not been able since 2019 to send a team to Haiti, in 2025 we donated \$2,000 for shoes and backpacks for the students at the church's school. In October, members of the Missions Committee visited St. Patrick's Episcopal Church in the Washington, DC, Georgetown neighborhood, which also has a long-standing mission with St. Etienne's, and discussed the possibility of our parishes working jointly. We will pursue this prospect in 2026.

Helping Around the World: Nigeria

Beginning in 2011, St. Paul's has supported the construction and operation of five schools in Gusau and Kaduna in northern Nigeria, serving a combined enrollment of 2,350 students. This area of Nigeria for many years has seen fraught relations between the Muslim (usually herders) and Christian (usually farmers) populations, and in the interest of fostering peace and equality the schools are purposely non-denominational, co-educational and open to all. Our work is through Africa Education Partnership (AEP), a non-profit American organization, and in coordination with the local Anglican bishops in Nigeria. Along with several parishioners who independently made donations to AEP, St. Paul's contributed \$6,400 from the Frank World Mission Fund to the operation of the schools. Pilgrimages

Searching for God

St. Paul's Center for Learning & Ministry

Four years ago, St. Paul's Center for Learning & Ministry created a vision to develop pilgrimages for the parish. These spiritual journeys would offer participants the opportunity to connect with God in a new way, through ancient cultures, sacred sites and Scripture. As they journey with fellow Christians, pilgrims would experience together the joy God has in store for those who seek Him on these uniquely designed excursions.

In 2025 St. Paul's organized two pilgrimages. During Eastertide 44 pilgrims from St. Paul's and seven neighboring congregations followed the journeys of St.

Paul in Greece. The group visited Philippi, the site of St. Paul's first missionary outreach in Europe. Other stops included Thessalonica, Berea, Athens, Corinth, Ephesus, and Crete. The itinerary also included a stop on the island of Patmos and a visit to the Cave of the Apocalypse where St. John wrote the Book of Revelation.

Each day began and ended with communal prayer, song and praise. The in-between times were filled with glorious surprises from God as the pilgrims reflected on the various letters of St. Paul and Revelation.

Walking on the streets where St. Paul walked and taught, seeing the cell where he was imprisoned in Philippi, and visualizing St. John's vision of the return of Jesus from deep within a cave on Patmos brought the faithfulness of these men and other early Christians to life for the pilgrims. Those who made the journey came back with a renewed sense of gratitude for the work of the saints in spreading the Gospel.

The second pilgrimage of 2025 was a half-day journey to Medina and its historic Spring Grove Cemetery. This glorious autumn day featured Morning Prayer, song, and reflections on seeking freedom from sin and death in Jesus Christ. Cemetery volunteers told how the cemetery was founded and gave accounts of the historic figures who are buried there, including a Medina couple whose home was a stop on the underground railroad.

The vision of these pilgrimages, to seek God, to find Him and to embrace Him, continues this year, from November 3-6, as another group of pilgrims goes on a journey of new beginnings to learn how God makes all things new. The New Beginnings pilgrimage features several stops, including to a replica of Noah's ark in Williamstown, Kentucky; the Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption in Covington, Kentucky; and Hopeton Earthworks, a ceremonial site of Native Americans in Chillicothe, Ohio. A second pilgrimage for 2026 is being planned for this spring in northeast Ohio, as well as a European pilgrimage in 2027. Details to come!

A Full Expression of The Christian Faith

In 2025, the Vestry continued to support, once again, the vision set out in our two-part mission statement:

To live out a full expression of the Christian faith.

To call all people to the new life of discipleship in Christ.

In addition to the legal and canonical (church laws) responsibilities entrusted to the Vestry, our Vestry continued its role as a wise counsel of advice, supporting the need for strategies and steps to increase foot traffic and to keep the task(s) of evangelism in front of us, endorsing new initiatives in this regard.

We continued to make steps in increasing attendance and revitalizing the choir with new members—and speaking of new members, we had 18 baptisms including two adults (!), and more young families join. The Vestry commended steady teaching on evangelism and, as ever, supported the work of the Missions Committee, marking the 13th year of the Community Meal, continuing to support Barnabas Ministries, and authorizing support for Haiti.

Leadership In 2025

2025 In Review

In 2025, parishioners' pledge and non-pledge donations exceeded budget, resulting in a net operating income of \$54,856 at year-end. The year 2025 marks the thirteenth year in a row of year-end operating surpluses - a blessing that we never take for granted.

As of Feb. 2, 2026, 133 parishioners submitted pledge cards for the 2026 calendar year, a 15% decrease over the 156 pledges received in 2025. The total pledged for 2026 is \$721,434, an increase of \$12,806, 2% more than the 2025 pledge total. The average 2026 pledge per pledging unit is \$5,424, a 19% increase over the 2025 average pledge. This marks the fifth year in a series of annual pledge increases – another blessing.

Throughout 2025, parishioners continued to contribute generously to our restricted funds - special funds entirely separate from the operating budget that are restricted as to purpose. Restricted funds revenue and expense for the year ending December 31, 2025, was \$691,848 and \$619,533, respectively. Included in these totals, Mission-related activities, programs, and donations accounted for \$124,803 in revenue and \$84,441 in expense.

We are thankful every day for the blessings of generosity, commitment, perseverance, selflessness, and kindness of our members and staff as we work together for the greater good in God's kingdom.

Supporting The Future Of St. Paul's

The Endowment Foundation of St. Paul's Episcopal Church is a perpetual fund supporting our church's mission and ministry.

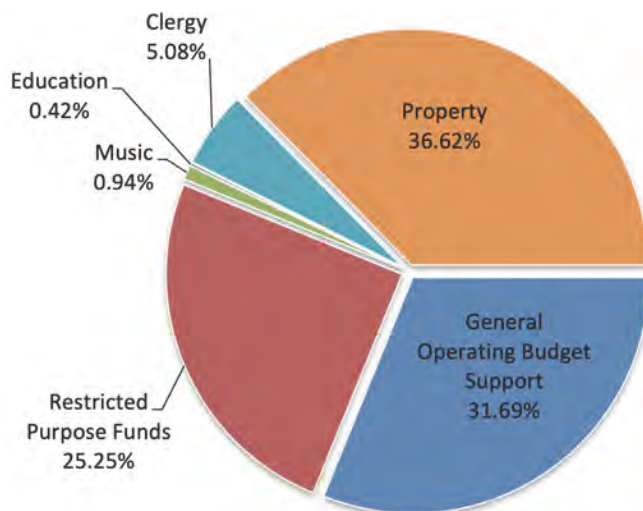
It includes an unrestricted General Endowment as well as funds designated by donors for specific purposes. Each year, in accordance with established procedures, the Endowment distributes funds to the Church. The amount is determined by a set policy and is periodically reviewed and approved by the Vestry. This ensures that the Endowment can provide stable, long term, ongoing support.

2025 Activity

Gifts and bequests totaled \$64,698. Thank you, donors!

The 2025 distribution to the church was \$610,700 which went to the Parish Operating Budget, Property, Clergy, Education, Music, and other Specific Purposes as instructed by donors. The distribution is calculated under a policy formula and is approved by the Endowment's Board and the Vestry. The total draw of the Endowment remains less than 5% in keeping with best practices.

The operating budget reached another new milestone in 2025 - \$1.5 million. Thanks to our faithful contributors and our endowment, we were able to operate in 2025 with all our staff and programming in place - and we ended the year with a net income of \$54,856. Revenue sources followed the budget closely through October,

then increased over budget in November and December, adding an additional \$57,480 over budget by year-end. Operating expenses ran under budget through November, exceeding the year-end budget by only a small margin.
