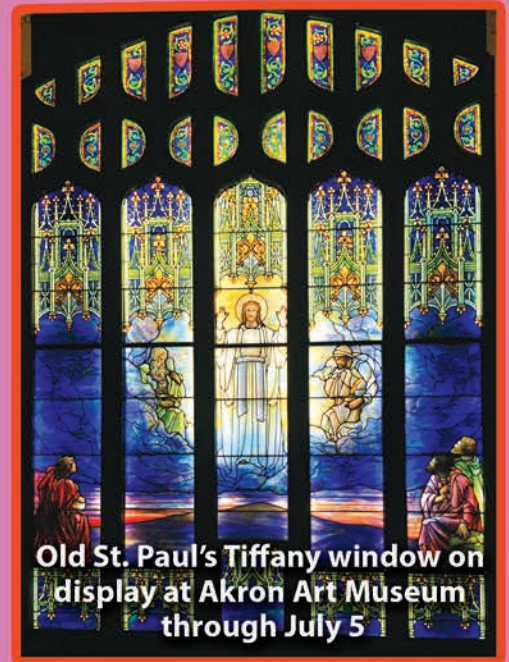

## FROM THE RECTOR

### HIGHLIGHTS IN THIS ISSUE

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### Confirmation, Reception, and Renewal

The Bishop of our Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Anne Jolly, will be with us on **May 10<sup>th</sup>**, during which she will confirm (it looks like) a handful of our youth and possibly some adults. The numbers are in flux at the time of this writing, but the youth being confirmed will go on a retreat the weekend before the bishop's visit at the diocesan camp, Bellwether Farm; and there will be a newcomer's class on **April 26<sup>th</sup>** called **Explore St. Paul's** for adults after the 10:00 am service (read below).

In our tradition, every visit by a Bishop is a chance for our youth to make an intentional embrace of the faith—a *confirmation*, that is—and it's also a chance for those who were baptized and previously confirmed in another tradition to be *received* into our denomination by coming forward, kneeling before the bishop, and being blessed. Further still, the bishop will bless anyone who wishes to come forward for a *renewal* in their walk with Christ their Lord. It's an important service, always moving and always uplifting. We will be reminding ourselves of these things as the day approaches.

### Rogation Sunday

On **May 3<sup>rd</sup>** we enjoy bagpipers on Rogation Sunday, followed by an ice cream social. This is a tradition at St. Paul's that goes back, I'm

told, at least 40 years. Rogation comes from the Latin word '*rogare*' which means '*to ask*'—and the asking we do is for God's blessing on agriculture especially, along with the fruits of our labor. Traditionally, in England, church members would walk the bounds of their parish (not just the church grounds, but the fields that made up the locality that was associated with a particular church) and ask for blessings as they went, acknowledging thereby their dependence on God's providential care.

We invite people to contribute on this day to our grounds—to the upkeep of our plantings and toward special new plantings

### Explore St. Paul's

To learn more about the mission and ministries of St. Paul's, we invite all newcomers, inquirers, guests, and others, to come to room G-4 on **Sunday, April 26<sup>th</sup>** following the 10:00 am service. This is a chance to learn about the steps to become a member, or be confirmed, or just learn more about our congregation. It's also a time to meet our clergy and other leaders. Attendance in no way commits one to join. The session lasts about 90 minutes, and we serve a light brunch (bagels and various spreads generally). Sign up is required, at the front desk or online.

### The Easter Fund Appeal

This year's Easter Fund Letter comes with the headline **'Let It Roll!'** The source here is the cry of the prophet Amos: "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!" (Amos 5:24). One dimension of justice is *distributive* justice, sharing what we have of the world's resources with others. Please read the letter and consider how you might help.

Also consider reading a book with the same title, the biography of John Perkins, a native of Mississippi born in 1930. He wrote *Let Justice Roll Down* in 1976, and the book was reprinted many times, most recently in 2012, copies of which are available to read on our book carts.

The Seattle Pacific University newsletter (Winter 2009) provides this summary as an enticement to read the book: Perkins 'fled the South, worked his way up into a good-paying job, and, by the 1950s, he and his wife, Vera Mae, owned a 12-room house in Southern California. When he became a Christian in 1957, however, Perkins' priorities changed forever. He believed God was calling him to leave his comfortable life and return to his home state. John, Vera Mae, and their five children drove cross-country, back into poverty-ridden and racially charged Mississippi, "to identify with my people there, and to help them break the cycle of despair — not by encouraging them to leave, but by showing them new life right where they were."

In Mendenhall, Perkins began teaching the Bible, creating self-help cooperatives to foster economic independence, and, before long, raising his voice in civil rights demonstrations. The progress of the African American community in Mendenhall — and the leadership of Perkins — was a direct challenge to the traditional white power structure in Mississippi. One evening in 1970, long-pent-up anger and frustration erupted, and Perkins was almost killed at the hands of white Mississippi police officers. Arrested and imprisoned on an unidentified charge, he was beaten savagely. With an open head wound, barely alive, he was forced to mop up his own blood.

Instead of dying that night in jail, as many thought he would, Perkins survived to spend many months fighting injustice in the court system, fighting depression and a host of physical ailments that came from the beatings, and finally fighting bitterness against whites — including white Christians — who made life so miserable for his people. "Everything added up to the conviction that there was no justice at all," he wrote in *Let Justice Roll Down*. "No justice at all for any black who wanted to stand up like a man in Mississippi."

But during a time of introspection so intense that it was "crucial to the whole meaning of my life," the 41-year-old emerged with a renewed spirit and vision for the future: "The Spirit of God kept working on me and in me until I could say with Jesus, 'I forgive them too.' I promised Him that I

would 'return good for evil,' not evil for evil. And He gave me the love I knew I would need to fulfill His command to me of 'love your enemy.'"

There is also a brief YouTube clip devoted to Perkins story worth watching, here's the link ([https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=scRpgoR\\_qyo](https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=scRpgoR_qyo)) and the title is Redemption - The John M. Perkins Story. His story reminds us of the work that goes on *outside* the walls of churches, just as Jesus labored *outside* the walls of the Temple and the synagogues—and that's where we will so often see God's saints. And Perkins, still alive and active, did so much with only a third grade education. Astonishing!

Our Easter Fund is one of the ways we help work that goes on outside of our walls.

## STEPHEN MINISTRY

**Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me. I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing. *John 15:4-5***

At our Tuesday Lenten Luncheons, John 15:4-5 was one of the main verses we discussed and prayed on. What hope there is in these two verses! Knowing that we have a "shoulder to lean on" and giving Jesus our heart and soul, we will flourish! As we approach spring and continue our Lenten studies, we have an opportunity to evaluate our lives, spiritually, emotionally and physically. 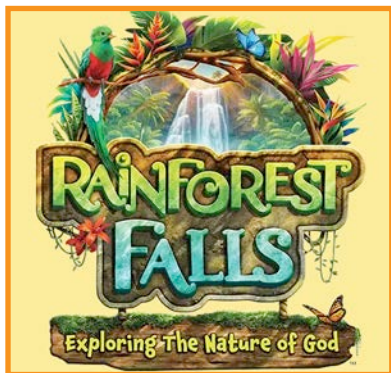

### The Quiet Committee

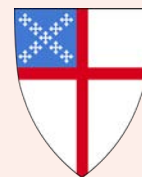
