
Every Person Valued by God

I write this on St. Luke's Day. *The Gospel of Luke* provides our readings this autumn for Sunday mornings and is the subject of our Tuesday Bible study. The deep dive into Luke on Tuesdays has been especially meaningful to me. Luke, generally thought to be a physician, accordingly, gives a high profile to Jesus' compassion. Luke reveals his own compassion in showing how Jesus is compassionate: Jesus heals the sick, he feeds the hungry, he seeks the lost, he interacts with those on the fringes of society. All this powerfully displays God's utter love for the world in Christ. It's big picture stuff.

Luke also subtly reinforces this point. For instance, he carefully speaks of "men with leprosy" not "lepers," and of "a man with a demon," not "a demoniac." (Luke 17:12; Luke 8:27). Many translators overlook this or count it unimportant. But it's Luke's way of humanizing people who are otherwise labelled. It reminded me of a popular campus speaker, Tony Campolo, who years ago began a talk with the question "What did Jesus say when he met a prostitute?" A student from the crowd shouted, "Jesus never met one!"

Campolo was initially stunned. But later he got the point the student was trying to make with his rhetorical parry. Jesus saw the person, whatever their condition, as of infinite worth to God. Without revoking the call to repentance and surrender that he extended to all, Jesus displayed the value of every person to God. It's a lesson from Jesus' life and ministry for all of us to learn and relearn, in relation to others, and to ourselves. Even so when we set out, with good motives, to help those in need of deliverance, or in need of putting their lives together. Whatever problems a person *has*, that person is more than "A Problem." So, too, for each of us. See Luke 12 and be reminded that God's care for the 'birds of the air' is daily before us, and "how much more are we worth to God."
