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Grace Under Pressure

Athletic trainers, more and more, teach relaxation techniques because, physiologists say, a relaxed muscle works best. When a muscle is constantly tense, the muscle becomes shortened, which reduces the muscles' length, power, and coordination.

Composure, relaxation, or "grace under pressure" to use Hemingway's phrase, ought to characterize the lives of Christians individually and collectively. Indeed, as we model composure, we might bear witness to a world frittering away its joy because it's overanxious, and lacking confidence in the possibility of a slow, steady, and humane ordering of life.

In the ordering of our lives, we recall Jesus' rebuke of Martha (whom he loved and commended elsewhere) who was tense, anxious, and distracted in her approach to responsibility. More positively, if we intentionally embrace the grace extended to us, we learn that our lives don't have to dissipate into a million unrelated, busy tasks (and worries.) Instead, if we treasure the gospel, ground ourselves in its truth, and dare to live it out, our lives will find a lasting unity of purpose and direction. God's purposes will prevail.

This holds true for each of us and for the activities of the church as an institution. One author says: "The apostolic church knows that it's sent to proclaim a gospel that will look out for itself. The apostolic church knows that Jesus Christ is alive, unfettered, and omnipotent, striding ahead of us into the world. It's not the church's task to do Jesus Christ's work for him; it's the church's task simply to let him do his work to us and among us and to be the means through which he may choose to do that work ..." (John Webster, *Christ Our Salvation*, 'Creatures of Grace', p. 170). Do we have this confidence? Is this us? Is this you? Is it me?

When we trust that Christ goes ahead of us, that he has prepared something for us to be and to do in each of our tomorrows, then the grace of Christ's composure will mark our lives and keep us in his joy and peace. In no way does this perspective lead to relaxing—viz., stopping—our efforts. No, it's a way to do our work best: composed, relaxed, and steady over a long course of time.

NEW TESTAMENT SCHOLAR RETURNS TO ST. PAUL'S


Guest Speaker: The Rev. Dr. Amy Peeler Women's Dinner – Friday, Oct. 24, 6pm All-Parish Breakfast – Sat., Oct. 25, 8:45am

The Rev. Dr. Amy Peeler will speak at two events in the fall—on Friday, Oct. 24th at 6pm at the women's dinner, then the following morning, Saturday, Oct. 25th at 8:45am at the allparish breakfast. Rev. Peeler joined us for these two events in 2024 and returns this fall to speak at the women's dinner on St. Paul's marriage metaphor and what it might mean for married and single women. The following morning at the parish breakfast, she will explore the themes of the liturgical season of Ordinary Time.

Rev. Peeler holds the Kenneth T. Wessner Chair in New Testament at Wheaton College (Illinois) where her academic research focuses on the letter to the Hebrews, the influence of the Old Testament on the New Testament, Israel's sacrificial system, and family and inheritance in

the ancient world. She is the author of *Ordinary Time:* The Season of Growth in InterVarsity Press' Fullness of Time series, which will be released on Jan. 27, 2026. Rev. Peeler was an editor of the New Testament in Color: A Multiethnic Bible Commentary, and authored Hebrews: Commentaries for Christian Formation, and Women and the Gender of God.

Rev. Peeler is also a regular contributor to *Christianity Today* magazine. In addition to her academic roles, she preaches and teaches at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Geneva, Illinois, where she is associate rector.

I recently heard a story at a conference on charitable giving. A friend, who works on staff at a religious charity, told me he had received an unusual packet in the mail. Opening it, he found a small strip of postage stamps worth just a few dollars. With the stamps was a note that said "I believe in what you are doing and want to support your mission. This is all I can give." There was no name. Turning back to the envelope, my friend saw the return address was the Colorado "Supermax" federal maximum-security prison.

Like the widow in the story of the widows' mite (Mark 12:41-44), this person gave everything they could. God cares more about the giver's intention than the size of the gift.
